CLASSES 66 – 68: HORTICULTURE

NOTE:

- * ALL FLOWERS AND BLOOMS EXHIBITED MUST BE GROWN BY THE EXHIBITOR.
- * FLOWERS ARE JUDGED ON CONDITION, FORM, UNIFORMITY, COLOUR AND SIZE.
- * BOUQUETS AND DISPLAYS ARE JUDGED ON FLOWERS ONLY
- * ARRANGEMENTS ARE JUDGED ON FLOWERS AND CONTAINERS.

General Rules:

1. Cut flowers are to be shown on their own stem with their own foliage.
2. Cut flowers should be as uniform in size as possible and if more than one bloom is requested then try to use the same colour, if possible.
3. Make sure to **measure the diameter** of the blooms and enter the proper size in the proper section.
4. A stem is a plant structure carrying one or more flowers and/or buds.
5. A bloom is an individual flower, one to a stem.
6. If a bud is showing colour, then it is considered a bloom.
7. Exhibits must contain the exact number of flowers specified in the section.
8. Remove wilted petals and remove debris from the pot. It benefits you to ensure all containers are clean.
9. In Dahlia classes the blooms should be approx. a 45 degree angle from stem.
10. The ideal Gladiola spike should be 1/3 open blooms, 1/3 bud and 1/3 green shown in a container that keeps the stem upright. If necessary pebbles, etc. may be used in the container to keep the stem in an upright position.
11. African Violets should contain only a single crown per pot.
12. In floral arrangements, the large flowers and strong colours are best placed at the base of the exhibit and the arrangement shall be viewed from all sides unless otherwise specified. The oasis or mechanics of an arrangement should not be visible.
13. Please note that an arrangement requires a fixative such as an oasis and a display does not have an oasis or fixative.

General Rules cont...

14. Make sure you note the size of the container or the measurements specified for each entry. When doing arrangements, a miniature design is not to exceed 5" (113cm) in any direction including the container base and accessories, small designs are 5.5" (114cm) to 10" (26cm) and must not exceed 10" (26cm) in any direction including the container base and accessories.
15. If an arrangement requires a candle then please ensure that it has been pre-lit and extinguished prior to exhibiting.
16. No noxious or invasive weeds to be used in exhibits.
17. **Please note that all entries are judged on a points system. If an entry does not meet the 1st place criteria then a second or third place ribbon will be awarded at the discretion of the judge.**

3. Quilts to be measured on the perimeter. Total perimeter measurement to be a minimum of 324 inches. Note the quilt can be square, rectangular etc. All 4 sides must be measured to determine the perimeter measurement.
4. The quilting must be through all 3 layers (top, batting and back) and not be mounted on a frame. The quilt may have a sleeve attached to the back for the purpose of hanging the quilt.
5. The winning OAAS Hand Quilt will not be eligible to compete in any future OAAS fair, district and/or provincial competitions.
6. It is the exhibitor's responsibility to give credit to the original designer of the quilt pattern based on copyright rules.

7. Each local fair is entitled to send their best of show of all eligible hand quilts to the district competition.
8. If the fair's best of show hand quilt has won at more than one fair, the exhibitor must consider their own agricultural society as the one from which the quilt will be sent to the district meeting, otherwise it should be sent from the agricultural society nearest his/her home address. The other fairs at which this quilt was entered and won, may enter their second best of show hand quilt into the district competition.
9. An exhibitor who wins more than one best of show title with different hand quilts at different fairs is entitled to enter each winning quilt in the district competition.
10. If an exhibitor is exhibiting in more than one district, they are entitled to enter different winning quilts at different district competitions but cannot enter the same quilt at more than one district competition.
11. The OAAS will award a ribbon to exhibitors of winning hand quilts at each district competition.
12. A photo of the top three placed hand quilts at the district competition must accompany the "OAAS Championship Quilt Entry Form"

MACHINE QUILTED QUILT COMPETITION

2. The quilt must be solely made, and machine quilted by the exhibitor and exhibited and judged at a local Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies (OAAS) fair to be eligible for this competition.
3. Quilts to be measured on the perimeter. Total perimeter measurement to be a minimum of 324 inches. Note the quilt can be square, rectangular etc. All 4 sides must be measured to determine the perimeter measurement.
4. The quilting must be through all 3 layers (top, batting and back) and not be mounted on a frame. The quilt may have a sleeve attached to the back for the purpose of hanging the quilt.
5. The winning OAAS Machine Quilt will not be eligible to compete in any future OAAS fair, district and/or provincial competitions.
6. It is the exhibitor's responsibility to give credit to the original designer of the quilt pattern based on copyright rules.
7. The use of domestic, mid arm and/or long arm equipment is permitted on hand or computer guided machine quilt entries.



MACHINE QUILTED QUILT COMPETITION cont...

District Competition

1. Each local fair is entitled to send their best of show of all eligible machine quilts to the district competition.
2. If the fair's best of show machine quilt classes has won at more than one fair, the exhibitor must consider their own agricultural society as the one from which the quilt will be sent to the district meeting, otherwise it should be sent from the agricultural society nearest his/her home address. The other fairs at which this quilt was entered and won, may enter their second best of show machine quilt in the district competition.
